A large portion of the furniture and furnishings belonged to the Gilsey estate and were leased with the hotel. The appraisers inventoried the whole at \$6,338, but of this, the Gilsey estate claimed about \$2,000 as its property.

Bankruptcy Petitions Dismissed.

Judge Holt has dismissed the petition in bankruptcy filed on Dec. 18 against Tobias Korn, who did business as the Baltimore Cloak Company at 2 Lispenard Street, on a settlement at 25 cents on the dollar, 20 cents in cash and five cents on a note at nine months. Liabilities were \$14,000.

Judge Holt has dismissed the petition in bankruptcy filed on Sept. 4 against William Brauman & Co., wholesale woolens and cloakings, 125 Greene Street, on a settlement at 50 cents on the dollar. Liabilities were \$106,713 and actual assets \$66,228.

Judge Holt has dismissed the petition in bankruptcy filed on Sept. 4 against David Orently, wholesale silks and satins, 125 Greene Street, on a settlement at 50 cents on the dollar. Liabilities were \$25,261, and actual assets \$15,760. Mr. Orently was also a partner in the firm of William Brauman & Co.

Receivers Appointed.

Judge Truax of the Supreme Court has appointed Samuel Sanders receiver for the John C. Gabler Company, carpenters, 339 West Eighteenth Street, bond of \$12,000, in proceedings for the voluntary dissolution of the company. Liabilities are \$58,563 and actual assets, \$11,162. The receivership was on account of a judgment obtained in Brooklyn on Nov. 14 for \$40,000 by James F. Hughes, who was hurt by a brick which fell from a building on which the company had a contract.

Judge Truax of the Supreme Court has appointed William H. Hilton of Newburg temporary receiver for the Hollow Brick and Concrete Construction Company of this city in proceedings for the voluntary dissolution of the corporation brought by Edwin R. Jarvis and Waldo E. Austin, two of the Directors. Liabilities are \$23,380 and assets, \$2,508. The company was incorporated Jan. 5, 1908, with capital stock of \$25,000.
