PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 13.—Pennsylvania kept its basket ball record clean of defeat blotches and pushed a contender from a pace-setting position by bagging its second Intercollegiate League victory tonight by 24 to 14, Columbia, the conqueror of Cornell, being on the small end of the tally.

The low score of the Morningside Heights team can be traced directly to its lack of a good player to shoot from the foul line. Twelve times the Blue and White players toed the chalk mark at the fifteen-foot line, and only two of these tries were turned into counts. These two were made by Katz, who supplanted Latour at right forward late in the second half. Latour, Leonard, Alexander, and Farer all failed in their efforts at foul shooting.

Roberts, the slim New York forward, was the bright spot in the Columbia gloom. The frail chap from Morningside Heights was all over the floor and was truly the main cog in the Blue and White machine. He was guarded by Eddie McNichol, rated as one of the fastest guards in the league, but still he managed to slip away from the Red and Blue Captain for three baskets.
