PHILADELPHIA, March 10. — The Princeton basket ball team, struggling to remain in the race for the championship of the intercollegiate league, defeated Penn tonight by the score of 18 to 16. The work of Paulson, the diminutive Tiger forward, was the feature of the first half. Although unable to score from the field he registered seven straight foul goals, and his fast floor work kept the Red and Blue forwards shooting from the centre of the floor.

The star of the contest was Jefford, the tall Penn centre. He was the only player on either side to score more than one field goal, and although outjumped by the lanky McGraw, he outplayed him on the floor and kept his total to one freaky field goal.
