Quaker Quintet Continues Its Defeatless March In League Race.

Gaining the lead after about ten minutes of play in the first half, the basket ball quintet of Pennsylvania University last night defeated the Columbia University five in a fast game on the Columbia court by the score of 29 to 24. This victory gave the team from Philadelphia an even firmer hold on the lead in the Intercollegiate League standing, with five games won and none lost.

The Morningside Heights players were in the front only in the first ten minutes of play. Two goals from the floor, caged in quick succession by Farer, the Blue and White left forward, gave the Columbia five a lead of 4 to 0, which they maintained until the half was about ten minutes old. Then the Pennsylvania offensive became concentrated, and snappy passing, with accurate shooting, gave the visitors the lead. Quick and effective plays followed one another thereafter to the end of the half, and the Philadelphians rolled up an advantage of 16 to 7 before the whistle.
