TIGERS BEAT PENN IN FINAL CONTEST

Quaker Basket Ball Titleholders Checked by Princeton in Last League Game.

PRINCETON. N. J., March 9.-The University of Pennsylvania basket ball five, winners of the Intercollegiate League championship, lost their final league contest to the Tigers here tonight by a score of 27 to 22. The Princeton team assumed the lead after about five minutes of play, and continued to hold it for the rest of the contest. At no time were the Princeton players leading by more than five points. At times they had only a one-point advantage.

The result of the contest has no bearing on the league title, but it gives Princeton a better hold on second place. The Quakers had clinched the title by previously winning the first nine of their ten league games. Syracuse is the only other college five that has defeated the Quakers, and it is not a member of

the intercollegiate league.

Both teams played cautiously for the first few minutes, and after about five minutes of play the score stood 2 to 2, the result of free throws by Flinn and Martin. Then Horne scored a field goal for the Tigers on a pretty play. The tally seemed to wake both teams up, and after that there was little time when the contest was not thoroughly exciting. exciting. Both teams guarded closely, and a great many of the scores were made on long shots. Penn made only two tallies as a result of scrimmages under the basket. The Tigers seemed to have a little the edge on team play during the entire contest. during the entire contest.
