

PENN STATE MATMEN WIN COLLEGE TITLE

**Cary, Neito and Black Score
Heavily for Victors—Cor-
nell Is Second.**

YALE TAKES THIRD PLACE

**Trails Ithacans by Two Points
and Leads Lehigh by One—
Elis Score Two Falls.**

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 22.—Penn State won the Eastern Intercollegiate wrestling championship at Yale today, with Cornell second, the latter beating out Yale by reason of its victories in the second place bouts. Penn State took the honors from Cornell, which won the championship at Ithaca last year.

The point scores were: Penn State, 22; Cornell, 17; Yale, 15; Lehigh, 14; Pennsylvania, 4; Princeton, 3; Columbia, 0.

Penn State's victory was due largely to the individual championships won by Cary, Neito, the Japanese star, and Black in their respective classes. Cary defeated McWilliam of Cornell in the 115-pound class on the referee's decision. Neito had to go two extra periods before he won the referee's decision over Brennan of Cornell in the 135-pound final, and Black was carried two extra periods by Winters of Yale before he won the decision in the 145-pound class.

Yale scored the only two falls in the individual finals and also produced the only two-time winners of the meet when Captain Batty and Russell won their bouts. The former threw Burden of Penn State in 14 minutes and 40 seconds and the latter threw Burke of Lehigh in 11 minutes and 45 seconds. Cornell received its single championship when May scored in the first place final of the 158-pounds bout and Warriner of Lehigh, victor in the 125-pound division, captured the only title his team gained.

Following the competition for the first place championships the bouts to determine the second place winners were held. Penn State, which had clinched the championship by scoring heavily in the first place matches, failed to gain a point in the second place bouts, but it was in this division that Cornell beat out Yale for second place in the final team standing.

GOULD WILL PLAY TODAY.

**Will Pair With Fulton Cutting in
Court Tennis Exhibition.**

An exhibition court tennis match will be played at the Racquet and Tennis Club today in which Jay Gould and Fulton Cutting will be opposed to Jock Soutar and C. Suydam Cutting. The match will begin at 11:30 o'clock. Gould, the national singles and doubles champion, has been at the top of the amateur ranks in this country for almost twenty years. Last May he suffered his first defeat in over fifteen years of play when he lost to E. M. Baerlein in the deciding game of the play for the Bathurst Cup at Paris.

Both Fulton and Suydam Cutting are among the leading players of the game in the country and were runners-up for the national doubles title this year to Gould and Joseph W. Wear of Philadelphia. Jock Soutar of the Philadelphia Racquet Club is one of the leading professional players of the world. He holds the world's racquets title, which he successfully defended for the last time against Charles Williams of England in December, 1922.

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
