

PENN'S LATE DRIVE SUBDUES COLUMBIA

**45,000 See Lions Stage Early
March and Score, but Red
and Blue Wins, 34-7.**

LIFLANDER CROSSES LINE

**Takes 30-Yard Pass From Scott
Back of Victors' Goal in
First Few Minutes.**

TIDE THEN TURNS FOR PENN

Murphy Heads Attack, Which Nets

Two Touchdowns In 2d Period

and Three in 4th.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 17—Twenty-five years after a Blue and White team last defeated Pennsylvania on the football field, Columbia saw the mirage of victory over her ancient rival today, but the pleasing vista was abruptly blotted out as Lou Young's high-gearred attacking machine overcame a 7-0 deficit going into the second quarter and rushed over five touchdowns to win by the conclusive score of 34 to 7.

About 40,000 of the 45,000 spectators in the towering stands of Franklin Field stadium looked on in consternation as Charley Crowley's eleven put her more highly rated opponent in the hole at the very outset with a 30-yard pass from Harry Scott to Liflander, who caught the ball on the run behind Penn's goal line. The 5,000 loyal followers of the Blue and White and their fifty-piece band made a bedlam of the place as they had been doing for the entire first five minutes of the game.

Little Phil Liflander had run back the opening kick-off twenty yards and on the first scrimmage the Columbia quarterback had added twenty more around his own right end.

Then Bill Buser rounded Penn's left end for 15 yards to put the ball on the 22-yard line. He had hardly been thrown to earth when the Penn varsity rushed out on the field.

Scott Passes to Liflander.

Scott was thrown for a 5-yard loss, but he made up the distance on the next play, and like a bolt from the blue the Columbia halfback ran ten yards behind his line and hurled the ball thirty yards down the field, squarely into the hands of Liflander.

That was the climax of the game for Columbia. Penn had the vastly superior attack, which was to make itself manifest forthwith.

Captain Scull, Paul Murphy and Johnny Shober, as hard-hitting and fast-stepping a trio of backs as has worn the Red and Blue in many years, operating behind a powerful charging line, had only to be given the ball to thoroughly disillusion the Columbians of their hopes of victory.

So adept were they in their manipulation of the hidden ball, so ruthlessly did they smash through the Columbia line and so elusive were they once they got beyond the line of scrimmage that it was well-nigh impossible to check them without a gain.

Columbia Starts Brilliantly.

The brilliant manner in which Columbia started off filled her followers with elation. Taking the opening kick-off, little Phil Liflander ran it back twenty yards and on the first scrimmage he ran twenty yards more around his right end to near midfield.

On an exchange of kicks Bob Hamilton made a run back of thirty-three yards to Penn's thirty-three-yard mark. Bauer carried the ball to the twenty-two-yard line for a first down and here Lou Young rushed in his regulars.

A five-yard loss was offset by a similar gain by Scott, and on the next play Scott threw his pass to Liflander, letting the ball go from the thirty-yard mark. The Columbia quarter caught the ball on the run behind Penn's goal line with no one near, a beautiful play that set the Columbia stands wild with joy. Liflander kicked a goal from placement and the score was 7 to 0.

Stung to the quick, the Penn regulars launched their attack with a vengeance. Taking the kick-off, Murphy ran it back to his thirty-five-yard line. On a hidden ball play Scull gained seventeen yards and a fake pass, on which Shober carried the ball, netted another first down on Columbia's thirty-yard mark.

A pass from Shober to Opekun put the ball on the thirteen-yard line and two rushes carried it to the seven-yard mark. Here Penn was set back fifteen yards for holding, and although Shober completed another pass to Murphy Penn failed to make first down and Columbia took the ball on her fifteen-yard line.

Buser Punts to Mid-Field.

Buser's punt to mid-field put Columbia out of danger, but only momentarily. Penn's offense ripped Columbia's line apart until the ball rested on the twelve-yard line. Here the Blue and White forwards rose to the occasion splendidly and took the ball away from Penn on the fourth down, two yards away from the goal line.

Buser, standing behind his goal line, made a beautiful kick to mid-field and Liflander intercepted Shober's pass on Columbia's 30-yard line as the quarter ended. Penn made five first downs to Columbia's two in this period.

Starting from the 32-yard line, Shober and Scull carried the ball to the six-yard line in two plays, one a 38-yard run by Shober down the side line and the other a gain of 24 yards by Scull on the hidden ball play. Columbia was penalized to her one-yard line on this play and Shober took the ball over on the next scrimmage. Scull got the extra point on a dropkick and the score was 7-7.

Scott intercepted a pass for Columbia after an exchange of kicks on his 25-yard mark and a 25-yard penalty against Penn took the ball to mid-field, but on the next play Scull intercepted Scott's pass. On a fake

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pass Murphy carried the ball 15 yards and Shober added 10 more. An exchange of kicks put Penn back to her 22-yard mark and Davenport intercepted a pass near midfield, but Buser fumbled and Murphy recovered for Penn.

Murphy Stars on Attack.

The Penn attack ran wild again, or rather Murphy did. Almost single-handed he carried the ball forty yards down the field to Columbia's 11-yard line. Here, for some inexplicable reason, the Penn quarter called for a drop-kick on second down. Scull's effort failed and Columbia took the ball.

The Columbia quarter called for a pass deep in his own territory. Westgate intercepted the ball on the New Yorkers' 24-yard line, and on the next play Shober threw a 35-yard pass to Schaaf, who caught the ball over the goal line for a touchdown. Scull drop-kicked a goal for the extra point just before the half ended, making the score 14-7.

Late in the third period Scull carried the ball to midfield, where Campbell intercepted a pass. After a series of punts, the Penn attack regained its momentum. Scull broke loose on a run of thirty-five yards and Shober added fifteen more, putting the ball on Columbia's 15-yard mark as the period ended.

In the final quarter Penn ran wild. Starting from the 15-yard line, Murphy took the ball over on a fake pass. Scull drop-kicked the goal for the point, making the score 21-7.

Murphy Again Crosses Line.

A fumble by Stanczyk was recovered by Westgate on Columbia's 30-yard line. Murphy and Scull carried the ball to the 10-yard mark and Murphy again made the touchdown. Once more Scull sent a drop-kick over for the extra point, and the score-board read 28-7.

Penn's final touchdown came on a 50-yard march, with most of the second string men on the line-up. From Midfield, the Red and Blue backs carried the ball to Columbia's 22-yard line. Rosenbloom broke loose and ran the remaining distance to the goal line. Pine's place-kick for the extra point was blocked and the score stood 34-7. The teams remained deadlocked for the few minutes of play remaining.
