ASSELIN SETS THE PACE

Columbia came back into the thick of the battle for the Eastern Intercollegiate Basketball League championship yesterday by defeating the University of Pennsylvania, in the Columbia gymnasium, 29-19, before an Alumni Day gathering of 2,000 persons.

By virtue of their victory, the Lions became the possessors of third place in the League. So effective was the Blue and White outfit in its conquest of the favored Philadelphians that supporters of the Morningside five already are looking forward to Columbia's all-important encounter with Yale here on Friday as the contest on which the Lions' championship aspirations will rise or fall.

The Columbia wrestling team got away to a good start to defeat Syracuse, 20-8, in the final event of the Alumni Day program. The Lions won six of the eight bouts and piled up 17 points in the five events to be assured of victory before the Orange grapplers gained a decision.

It was the sixth victory of the year for the undefeated Blue and White.

Follow the Ball Persistently.

Columbia's basketball victory was gained by its persistent following of the ball. The Blue and White moved with dazzling speed, and when goals were missed at either end of the court there were at least three Columbians on hand to get the ball off the back-board and launch another drive.

It was the sharpshooting of Red Asselin, sophomore ace, that offset the combined efforts of the Penn five in the first half. Columbia had a 13-9 advantage at intermission, and eleven of the Lions' points came from the unerring contributions of Asselin.

Although he failed to score in the second period, Asselin was the big offensive factor. Tom Tomb, the other sophomore in Columbia's forecourt, scored eight points, as did Ken Hashagen of Penn.

Penn Defense Finally Breaks.

Penn's defense stood the test of the Lions' attack in the first few minutes, but McDowell finally flipped in a goal on an outside play. Freeman deadlocked the count at 2-2.

Then Asselin came to the fore with a goal, resulting from a perfect play from tap-off to basket. Hashagen tied the score and Asselin sent Columbia into the front with a long goal from the sidecourt and free toss, making the Lions' lead, 7-4.

Hashagen's long shot and another from close to the goal gave Penn its first advantage, and Klempner increased it to 9-7 on a foul toss. With five minutes remaining to play Asselin fired in three goals from various angles to give the Blue and White its half-time lead of 13-9.

O'Donnell's long goal pulled the Red and Blue up to a two-point deficit, 13-11, at the start of the second half, but Hartman came along with two free shots and Tomb scored a floor and a foul goal to put the count at 18-11.

Walters Sends in Foul.

Walters sent in a foul and Tomb increased Columbia's lead to 20-12 with a goal on a pretty pass from Meisel.

Walters dribbled through for a goal and McDowell and Hashagen followed with successful shots as the score went to 22-16. McDowell followed Hartman's attempt with a goal, and Tomb popped up with another goal and a foul to send Columbia further on the road to victory, the score going to 27-16.

Hartman's high and arching goal went through the rim, and in the last two minutes Penn's hopes were revived as O'Donnell put in a floor goal and a foul.
