Penn, its fellow tenant along with Harvard of the Eastern Intercollegiate Basketball League cellar, and hopped into a tie with Yale for fourth place as the crowning touch Heights. The Lions toppled the Quakers, 48 to 34, and nudged them into last place undisputed, while idle Harvard was jostled into sixth. The Light Blue five thrilled some 2,000 old grads by unfolding their best game of the season, completing a successful day for Columbia teams. In the afternoon the Lion varsity fencers vanquished Princeton, 16 to 11, while the freshmen turned back the Tiger cub swordsmen, 15 to 12. Only the wrestlers were thrown for a loss as Cornell

won 23 to 3. Coach Paul Mooney of the court operatives had been moaning all season that his heroes seemed utterly unable to go over the 40point mark. But they did it this time with a vengeance as they combined accuracy with the usual Lion drive and hustle.

Home Team Starts Slowly

Columbia tallied precisely one point in the first four minutes, while Penn built up a 9-1 lead. But as soon as the Blue discovered the general whereabouts of the basket, Lon Jourdet's boys went into a scoring fog, going 12 minutes without a point.

Columbia, refusing to let an opportunity like that go whisking by, pieced together fifteen straight points and had a 16-9 advantage. Play was fairly even for the rest of the period so that the Lions had a 20-14 lead at the intermission. Columbia's defense became ada-

mant starting the second half and the center alley was plugged up so neatly that Penn's scoring chances were few and far between. There was really nothing to it after that. Columbia's lead went as high as 19 points and Mooney rushed in his reserves. However, he did leave Albie Myers

in long enough to register 13 points and hence leap from fifth among the league scores to second with 66 markers. The little whirlwind was matched by Sophomore Bill Hasslinger, who also had 13.

But the spark plug of the Columbia attack was Sophomore Johnny Cerrone, who directed play and kept digging every minute. In these tactics he had plenty of company, for the Lions were plucking rebounds off both baskets and had such complete control of the ball that they also had complete control of the game. Furthermore the Blue was breaking mighty fast and never easing up on the pressure.

## Soleliac Is Impressive

Sid Levinson was high gun for the Quakers with 8 points but Henry Soleliac caught the eye as being the Philadelphian with the greatest possibilities for the future.

At a luncheon in John Jay Hall two annual trophies were awarded. The Bouvier Memorial Rowing Cup, for the most improved sophomore oarsman, went to Edward Gibbon, while the Class of 1913 Football Cup, for the athlete withe the highest scholastic average, was presented jointly to Vince Gutendorf, reserve quarterback, and Val Diehl, reserve tackle. Their averages for the first semester were identical.


