

PENN NINE DOWNS HARVARD BY 11-7

Home Runs Help Quakers Post Second Triumph in Eastern League

PHILADELPHIA, April 23—Pennsylvania scored its second victory in three Eastern Intercollegiate League baseball games by defeating Harvard, 11—7, today on Murphy Field. It was Harvard's first league game.

Penn, victorious over Brown and loser to Navy, tallied four runs in the first inning on home runs by Dave McKinley and Doug McKay, a single by Bill Kesack, a double by Ed Shaw and errors.

Kesack also homered in the third and tripled in the fifth, scoring on a wild pitch.

After retiring the first eleven men, Larry Purdy, the Penn pitcher, was found for a triple by Bill Bernstein in the fourth inning. Bernstein tallied Harvard's first run on Al Martin's single.

George Gary, the Penn catcher, hit a home run in the sixth. Kesack singled in the seventh for his fourth hit of the game and was brought in by Shaw's home run, Penn's eighth homer in two days.

A home run by Bernstein figured in Harvard's five runs on seven hits in the eighth inning.
