Newmark, Felsing Pace Lions to Seventh Straight

Columbia scored first and was never headed as it handed Brown an 84-50 defeat last night at University Gymnasium. The victory was the seventh in a row for the Lions, who returned home for the first time in a month. Columbia has a 12-2 won-lost record for the year.

The victory kept Jack Rohan's team in first place in the Ivy League with a 4-0 record. Brown has yet to win in league competition and occupies last place with an 0-4 mark.

The triumph was Columbia's most impressive since it embarked on an eight-game road trip Dec. 17. The Lions shot well—45.3 per cent from the floor—and outrebounded the Bruins, 64-45. The Lions played considerably better than they did when they defeated Brown on Dec. 29 to win the Kodak Classic tournament at Rochester.

Dave Newmark and Stan Felsing were the vital figures for Columbia once again. Felsing, a 6-foot guard, finished as the game's high scorer with 24 points, while Newmark, a 7-foot center, contributed 22.

Newmark's rebounding and scoring in the first half enabled Columbia to pull away to a 36-19 advantage at intermission.
