PRINCETON, N. J., Feb. 11

—Joe Heiser, a sophomore, scored 21 points to lead Princeton to a 79-67 victory over Brown tonight.

Hitting on driving layups and long jump shots, Heiser poured in 17 points as Princeton took a 41-33 half-time lead. Bill Reynolds, a sophomore guard, led the Bruins with 17 points, including 15 in the second half. Don Rodenbach, Gary Walters and Ed Hummer also hit double figures for the Tigers.
