

Columbia Beats Manhattan, 4-2, for 5th in Row

BROSNAN IS VICTOR WITH FIVE-HITTER

Southpaw Fans 6 and Gains 2d Triumph—Marcott of Princeton Tops Penn

The Columbia baseball team mounted a 10-hit attack and defeated Manhattan, 4-2, yesterday at Baker Field. The victory was the fifth in a row for the Lions who have won 10 and lost four games this season. Manhattan's record is 9-6.

Paul Brosnan, a sophomore left-hander, allowed only five hits and struck out six while going the route. He gained his second triumph of the season.

Columbia scored two runs in the first on singles by Rich Brown, Steve Richman and Larry Stallman and a double steal. Bob Bosson gave the Lions a 3-1 lead with a homer in the fifth.

The Jaspers scored their first run in the fourth when Phil Marzullo drove in Bob Chlupsa, who had led off with a double.

Marcott Excels on Mound

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 4—Graham Marcott, a former Brooklyn Little Leaguer, held Pennsylvania hitless for the first seven innings today in pitching Princeton to a 3-2 Eastern Intercollegiate League baseball victory on Stewart Field.

Harvey Morse leading off the eighth inning, got the first hit off Marcott. Pennsylvania made two more hits in the inning and scored two runs.

The third hit, by Dave Felser, dropped into right field while Brian Kochunas held up at third, thinking the ball would be caught. He could have scored the tying run.

Kochunas, a sophomore and a right-hander, pitched for Penn and struck out seven as against eight for Marcott. The Princeton right-hander, who had pitched a no-hitter against Villanova in the Tigers' first game of the season, has won four of six games, including two in the league.

Singles drove in Ron Landeck, Dave Martin and Jim Mosher with the Princeton runs. Fred Nocito, who ran for Morse, and Tom Harlow scored for Pennsylvania.
