

Dartmouth Topples Pennsylvania, 23-0; Koenig Is Standout

HANOVER, N. H., Oct. 14—Dartmouth placed its offense in the hands of Bill Koenig, a sophomore quarterback, against the University of Pennsylvania today and the 19-year-old athlete from Sale, Ore., performed flawlessly in guiding the Indians to a 23-0 victory over the Quakers.

Gene Ryzewicz, Dartmouth's senior quarterback and runner extraordinary, did not play and did not get into uniform for the game. He suffered a leg injury in the victory over Holy Cross here a week ago.

But Koenig, thrust into the spotlight, responded with a poised performance. Koenig fired one touchdown pass in the opening quarter, a 36-yard aerial to Randy Wallick, to start the Indians off to their third victory in three games and their first in the Ivy League.

Koenig engineered a Dartmouth passing and running attack that kept the Indians in control of the ball most of the game. Penn, forced to go to the air early, suffered from Dartmouth's pass rush and right line play on defense. The Quakers also hurt their own cause tremendously by dropping six passes with receivers in the clear. Five of those miscues came in the first half and stalled Penn's offense.

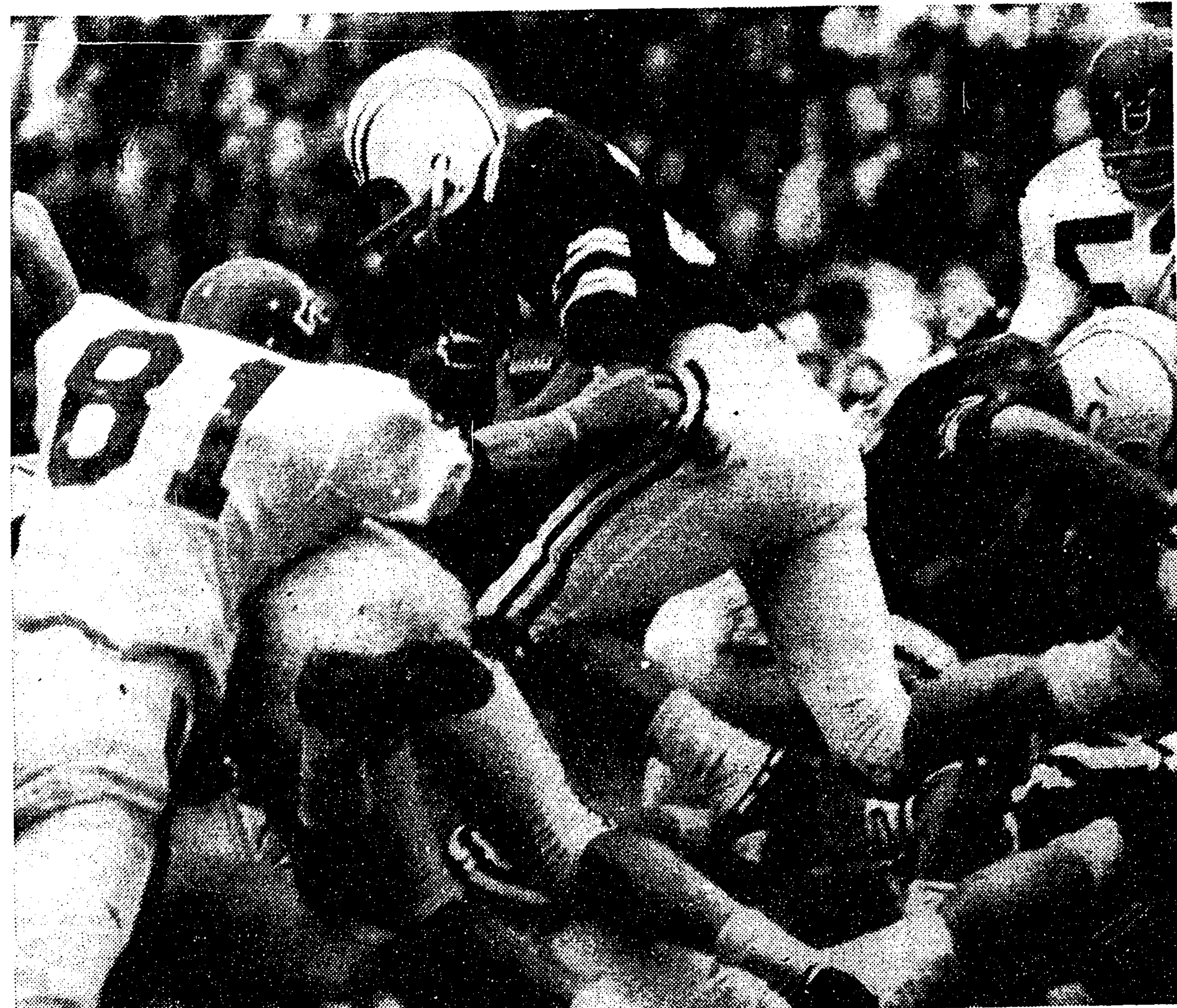
The Indians, behind Koenig's playmaking, rushed for 206 yards and passed for 213. Bill

Dartmouth Routs Penn, 23 to 0, As Wallick Twins Get 2 Scores

Creeden, Penn's star passer, gained only 83 yards through the air, was intercepted once by Jon Nistad and generally spent a frustrating afternoon against the Indians' defensive pressure.

The Indians also got outstanding performances from the Wallick twins, Randy and Rick. Randy, in addition to his scoring catch, snared two other aerials for a total of 70 yards.

Rick, a safetyman, turned in the play of the day when he ran back a Penn punt 59 yards midway through the opening quarter to send the Indians into a 13-10 lead.

Rick caught the ball on his own 41, picked up blockers and sped along the near sideline to score at 7:24, only 58 seconds after his brother had scored to cap a nine-play, 69-yard march.

Rick Lease recovered a fumble by Creeden to halt a Penn drive in the second period. Then Mark Warner of Penn intercepted a Koenig pass later in the period as the offensive punch for both teams bogged down.

But Koenig picked up the Dartmouth attack after the half-time intermission. In seven plays Dartmouth moved 68 yards following a Penn punt. Dave Boyle, a 180-pound fullback, capped the drive with a 1-yard plunge through the middle of the Penn line. The key play of that march was Koenig's 56-yard pass to Bob Mlakar that moved the Indians to the Penn 6.

Late in the final quarter Dartmouth began another sustained effort, marching 77 yards in 12 plays to cap the effort with Pete Donovan's 32-yard field goal. Randy Wallick had a hand in that march, too, catching a 23-yard pass from Koenig to keep the Indian rolling.

Penn's aerial attack was contained by Dartmouth's defense as well as by its own butterfingers receivers. The ground attack also failed.

Cabot Knowlton picked up 4 yards on 17 carries and Gerr Santini, a hard-hitting fullback, picked up 36 in 10 tries.

The Indians got more solid running from Capt. Steve Luxford, Koenig and Bill Donovan

Luxford gained 59 yards; Koenig, on the rollout, picked up 45 and Donovan 38.

Dartmouth's defense was sparked by Pete Lawrence, Giff Foley, Jeff Norton and Mike Machan up front with fine efforts from Norm Davis, Gordie Rule, Bruce Saylor and Lease behind the line.

Penn got notable play from John Martinowich and Capt. Wes Scovanner up front and Ben Gifford, Greg Zuch and Mike Eisenhower in the back of the line.

The victory was Dartmouth's eighth straight over Penn, but the Indians still trail in the series begun in 1896, 17-16-2. The defeat was the first in the league for Penn which beat Brown last week. The shutout was Penn's first in 14 games since Princeton blanked the Quakers in 1965. Dartmouth has a 3-0 mark.

The attendance was 12,540 under gray skies and a drizzle that fell throughout the second half making slippery going for the running backs.
