

Knowlton's 3 Scores Help Penn Beat Columbia, 26-6; Cornell 24-21 Victor

4 INTERCEPTIONS TURN BACK LIONS

and Establishes a Penn
Career Record of 731

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 18 —

Amid rain, snow flurries and sunshine, Pennsylvania beat Columbia today, 26-6, as the invading Lions demonstrated varying brands of football in the changeable weather.

Stopping the Columbia passing attack with four interceptions, including three in the final quarter, the Quakers scored in each of the last three periods. Cabot Knowlton led the way with three touchdowns.

The senior back from Pompano Beach, Fla., dashed 59 yards less than a minute after Columbia had opened the fourth quarter with a touchdown. It was the longest touchdown dash by a Penn back this season.

With two other shorter thrusts for tallies, Knowlton in all ran for 188 yards, 31 carries, thereby reaching a season total of 731, a Penn record.

Marty Domres, the Lions' quarterback and the Ivy League's top passer, had eight incompletions before he hit on a pass. Although the Lions staged a closing rally, three interceptions smothered their passing attack in the last 13 minutes.

Seeking its first league triumph, Columbia began to move after receiving the opening kickoff. But the offense could not carry through inside the Penn 15-yard line.

Domres, on third down, threw to Rick Rose, who dropped the ball. Rose's subsequent attempt for a field goal from the 20 failed as the kick was short.

As the rain began, a punt by Charles McVicker put Columbia in a hole on its 3. The Lions were forced to kick and Penn began a drive of 41 yards that culminated with a touchdown early in the second quarter.

Columbia penetrated into enemy territory as a sophomore fullback, Nat Hones, substituting for the injured Mike Busa, went 10 yards the first time he had the ball.

But George Burrell, a defensive back, intercepted Domres's pass, and the Columbia momentum stalled.

With the rain turning to snow, Domres finished the half with one of nine completions for 17 yards, while Bernie Zbrzezni, Penn's sophomore quarterback, had one of 14 for 14 yards.

After the intermission Zbrzezni's accurate passing marked a 60-yard drive in seven plays for the second Penn touchdown. Knowlton broke through from the 11 to score, after Zbrzezni had connected on a 32-yard pass play with Gerry Santini and hit Pete Wisniewski and Denny Blake for 13 and 11, respectively.

A Costly Fumble

Columbia responded by going 60 yards with Tim O'Connor, who had a total of 86 yards rushing, leading the ground drive. But O'Connor fumbled and the ball was recovered in the end zone by Penn's Mike Eisner to nullify another Columbia bid.

The Lions, however, came right back to the 1-yard line as the third period closed. Domres went over on the second play of the period, ending a 45-yard advance.

After receiving the kickoff, Penn scored on Knowlton's 59-yard spurt. With the score 20-6 against them, the Lions threatened again, moving to the Penn 10 only to lose the ball on an offensive interference penalty in the end zone.

Zbrzezni's pass to Owen brought the final Penn touchdown of the contest at Franklin Field before 9,145 fans.
