

# UNDEFEATED PENN ROUPTS LEHIGH, 34-0

Quakers Win 4th in a Row  
in Mud at Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 19—Undefeated Pennsylvania won its fourth game today, beating Lehigh, 34-0, in the mud at Franklin Field.

The Quakers had not won four straight games at the start of a season since 1959, when they went on to win their only Ivy League championship.

However, Lehigh was a non-league opponent, and not a very challenging one, at that. The last time Lehigh beat Penn was in 1889, and Penn has won 34 of the 36 meetings between the schools.

Next week should be a little more of a challenge. Many of the 8,916 fans who braved the rains today started chanting "we want Princeton" late in the game, a sign of tougher afternoons to come.

### Santini Takes It Easy

Penn had been conservative on dry ground in its first three victories, yet it was flamboyant in the mud today. Gerry Santini, the hard-working half-back, was virtually given the afternoon off, while the offense tried new tricks—like passing.

Bernie Zbrzezni, the chunky quarterback from Manor, Pa., had thrown only 41 passes in the first three games. Today, with the best of results, he and his two substitutes threw 22 times, completing 15. Theoretically, the receivers had a certain edge, since they knew where they were supposed to be going, while the defense didn't. But Rick Laubach, who holds all of Lehigh's passing records, completed only four of 10 before he and his muddy jersey were retired for the day.

Penn knew exactly what it was doing by opening up the offense. For one thing, the Lehigh defensive left end, Bob Bennicoff, was out with an injury, and a substitute named Bill Baar was replacing him. Zbrzezni exploited the new man perfectly, once on a keeper to that side, and several times on passes.

### Aerial Attack Expected

Zbrzezni completed his first eight passes during the two scoring drives in the first quarter. His fourth completion was an 11-yard touchdown play to Pete Blumenthal, of Valley Stream, L. I. The eighth straight completion also went to Blumenthal for a 7-yard touchdown.

The third touchdown was the most exciting play of the afternoon a sure indication that man has retained some of his amphibian characteristics. George Burrell, a defensive back who believes punts were made to be returned, slithered for a 62-yard touchdown.

Burrell started with two handicaps. One, a tarpaulin had covered the field before the game but 15 yards on each side of the fields were visibly soggy than the middle of the field. The second handicap was that Laubach's punt had just about rolled dead on Penn's 38-yard line, and three Lehigh defenders were nearby.

But as long as was there, Burrell decided to get some action. He picked up the ball before its final quiver and dashed to his left, away from the soggy sideline. This left three Lehigh men behind him right away. He broke a tackle by George Nicholson around midfield, then waited as three Penn players set up blocks. It would have been easier, under dry conditions, to go to the outside. But that was impossible. So Burrell just plowed past Jack Paget, the last defender, on the 30 and skidded his way home.

The jaunt was the third longest punt return for a touchdown in Penn history, behind Reds Bagnell's 74-yarder against Navy in 1919 and Bob Deuber's

69-yarder against Dartmouth the same year.

Penn later scored on two field goals by Eliot Berry, who also kicked the extra points, and a 2-yard plunge by Santini.

Santini had carried the ball 104 times in the first three games and only O.J. Simpson of Southern California had averaged more carries a game. Today the 5-foot-8-inch, 192-pounder from Syracuse carried only 11 times for 47 yards, but his blocking and decoying were relentless.

Lehigh had few heroes on this dismal day, while its record slipped to one victory and four defeats. Paget carried 11 times for 57 yards, the highest yardage of the day.
