

Elis Down Penn, 30-13

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 9—

There is always some suspense in Yale football games before it can be known if the Bulldogs will score in every period. But there is usually less suspense concerning the winner of the game.

Yale looked like the winner by the third period today, and it went on to beat Penn, 30-13, for Yale's 15th straight victory over two seasons and seventh straight this year.

But the winners dragged out the suspense until 9 minutes 45 seconds of the final period before scoring in that quarter. They have now scored in 16 consecutive quarters, going back to the last period against Brown.

Penn did manage to score two touchdowns in the final period, but the visitors had already established the superiority of Calvin Hill, Brian Dowling and both the offensive and defensive lines. Penn had lost only once before and still had hopes of winning the Ivy League title, but a 20-0 deficit by the middle of the third period ended that illusion.

The most obvious heroes, as

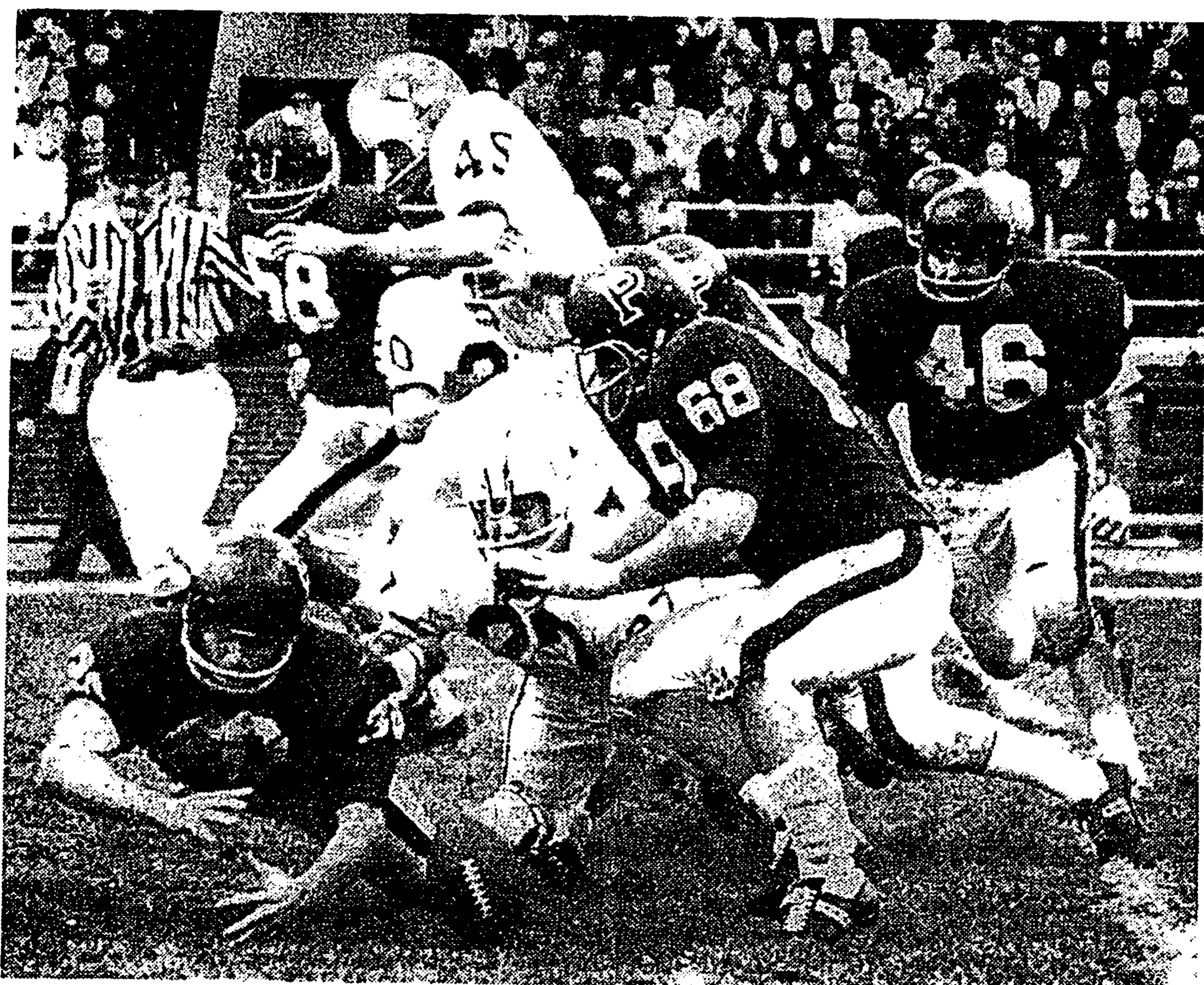

usual, were the ones who threw or carried the ball into the end zone.

And, as it has been for most of the Elis' streak, Dowling and Hill were the most obvious.

The two combined for the first touchdown, although Yale was lucky to have the ball at the time. Yale had been forced to punt two plays earlier, but a Penn defender had been caught roughing the punter, giving Yale an automatic first down. Very shortly, Dowling lofted a 50-yard pass to Penn's 10-yard line.

Hill, who does the triple jump and broad jump during the track season, performed the high jump this time, leaping a few feet above the defender, Steve Steinberg, tipping the ball with one hand, clutching it and bulling the last 10 yards.

The touchdown covered 52 yards from scrimmage. Dowling then ran for 2 extra points.

The Yale defensive backfield produced some nervous moments in the second period. Bob Kropke called for a fair catch of one punt but Mike Bouscaren moved in front of him and fumbled it away.

A few plays later, Kropke did get to catch a punt and he, too, fumbled it away. But Bouscaren made amends for both of them by intercepting a Penn pass and setting up the next touchdown. Dowling passed 12 yards to Del Marting for the touchdown and reached Marting again for the extra points.

Levin Runs 3 Yards

Yale scored again in the third period, with Bob Levin running the last 3 yards of a 41-yard, nine-play drive. Penn finally scored with 8:05 left in the game as Bernie Zbrzezni, the quarterback, sneaked for the last yard in a 40-yard drive.

But Hill scored again, running 15 yards over assorted Penn defenders. He also made a leaping catch between defenders in another drive and was thoroughly faster and stronger than anybody else.

Penn's other touchdown was a 9-yard run by Jim McFillin with 1:46 to go.

Dowling finished the game with nine pass completions in 18 attempts for 180 yards. He also gained 26 yards in seven of his brilliant keeper plays. His total yardage for the season—1,488 yards—broke the school record of 1,293, set by Ed Mulloy in 1952.

Hill carried 19 times for 126 yards, believed to be the most yards he has gained in one game.

Andy Coe led the Yale defenders with eight tackles and Pat Madden, Ed Franklin, Don Martin and Fran Gallagher all had their moments. Dave Pottruck made 10 tackles for Penn.
