

# PRINCETON TRIMS PENN TEAM, 42-0

Moore Goes Over 3 Times  
as Ivy Co-Leaders Take  
One-Sided Contest

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PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 25—  
The peace-loving nature of the Quakers was emphasized today as Pennsylvania's eleven from the City of Brotherly Love docilely bowed to Princeton, 42-0, before 26,000 fans at Palmer Stadium.

The rout demonstrated that Princeton, beaten twice in non-league play but undefeated in Ivy competition, had the potential to make a strong run for the title. It was the Tigers' third Ivy victory and enabled them to remain in a first-place tie with Dartmouth.

Princeton displayed a balanced attack that again established Scott MacBean as a fine passer, Robbie Bordley as a slippery, capable receiver and

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Brian McCullough as a dangerous ball-carrier.

From the start it was obvious that the Tigers had the more potent offense. Still it took them a full period to get it untracked. Held scoreless in the first quarter, they ran up three touchdowns in the second.

This concentration of power enabled the home forces to emerge with an impressive set of statistics. They finished with 246 yards rushing, 242 yards passing and 21 first downs.

In contrast, Penn, handicapped by the loss of Bernie Zbrzezni earlier this season, could produce only four first downs, one completed pass in 11 attempts for 4 yards and 44 yards on the ground.

## Fumble Leads to Score

But apart from failing to muster anything resembling a sustained attack, the Quakers committed mistakes that contributed to their defeat.

The game's second touchdown, for example, followed a Penn fumble on the Quaker 35. About two minutes earlier Princeton had tallied on a 3-yard pass from MacBean to Mark Biros.

The bobble, a roller, was recovered by Jim Nixon, and the Tigers scored in two plays with Ellis Moore lunging across from the 3. The tally was the first of three by the fullback from Westchester County.

Late in the third period Penn again did its part in lending Princeton a helping hand. Hickok's pass from his own 41 was snared by Keith Mauney, a Princeton defensive back, who sped 40 yards to the 1.

John Bjorklund was stopped as the quarter ended, then Moore produced his third touchdown.

Terry Groome, the fourth-string quarterback, came in for Penn, but was less effective than his predecessor. After Doug Blake had registered the Tigers' fifth touchdown on a 3-yard plunge, Groome set the stage for Princeton's final tally by throwing a pass that was intercepted by Bruce Corcoran on Penn's 19.

Princeton, penalized to the 32 for holding, went on to score with dispatch. With Arnie Holtberg, the kicking specialist now at quarterback, the Tigers reached the end zone in four plays. The payoff was an 18-yard aerial from Holtberg to Pete Hauck.

In all, Penn's passing attack boomeranged for four interceptions. The Quakers lost two fumbles and showed a shaky offense, being unable to get into Princeton territory once on their own power.
