

Harvard Defeats Penn, 20 to 6, as Hornblower Paces Attack With 173 Yards

VICTORY IS 71ST UNDER YOVCISIN

Equals Haughton's Record
—Ballantyne Scores on
61-Yard Punt Return

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PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1 — Penn and Harvard, teams going nowhere in particular in this year's Ivy League race, went at each other before a homecoming crowd of 30,943 in Franklin Field today and the Crimson came out on top, 20-6.

Ray Hornblower, a senior halfback, had the best afternoon of his career, gaining 173 yards in 28 carries to move into fourth place on the all-time Harvard rushing list, just 17 yards behind Bobby Leo at 1,612.

Hornblower's longest run was a 59-yard scamper off left tackle halfway through the fourth quarter for the last scoring play of the game. Hornblower also caught one pass for 37 yards.

Both teams have been hampered by the loss of their No. 1 quarterbacks and yesterday Penn was down to its fourth of the year. John Brown, an all-Ivy senior defensive back who hasn't called signals since his freshman year, was called on to handle the Quakers' quarterback chores.

Brown, 5-foot-10-inch, 169-pounder from Pittsburgh, completed seven of 15 passes for 59 yards and threw no interceptions. He also had no touchdown passes, but this wasn't a day for passing.

Harvard opened the game with a 12-mile-an-hour wind at its back, an advantage for a passing game, but elected to run the ball, getting to the 1-yard line before the Penn defense stiffened and forced them to turn the ball over on downs.

2 Field Goals for Szaro

On the next series of plays Dave Smith, the Harvard quarterback who has been starting since the third game of the year, decided to throw a pass and it was intercepted by Matt Lawler on the Penn 11-yard line.

The Quakers moved the ball to the 20, where they punted and John Ballantyne returned the punt 61 yards for Harvard's first score.

Richie Szaro, who added the extra point, also kicked a 22-yard field goal near the end of the same period giving the Crimson a 10-0 lead.

Penn got its only touchdown of the afternoon at the 5-minute mark in the second period, John Tremba running over from the 8-yard line to cap a drive that moved 68 yards in 14 plays.

Szaro added another field goal at 14:41 of the second period to give Harvard a 13-6 halftime lead.

In the waning moments of the third quarter Penn made another goal-line stand, stopping a drive that moved 47 yards.

The victory was the 71st of Harvard Coach John Yovicsin's career and tied him for the all-time lead among Crimson coaches with Percy Haughton, who coached Harvard to 71 victories, seven defeats and five ties from 1908 through 1916. Yovicsin's record since 1957 is 71-37-5.

Both teams are now even on the season at three victories apiece and Harvard is 2-2 in Ivy play while Penn is 1-3.

Steve Harrison was the game's second greatest ground gainer for Harvard with 90 yards in 20 carries.

Greg Leavitt led Penn with 39 yards gained on 11 carries, most of that in the first half. Harvard outrushed the Quakers, 335 yards to 83, net.
