

St. John's Crushes St. Francis; Georgetown Upsets Columbia

Redmen Win, 89-65

The Terriers of St. Francis had been barking loudly before entering the St. John's gym last night. They had scored seven victories in their first eight games, and were leading the country in field-goal percentage with a 55.6 average, but the St. John's Redmen took the bite out of them before 4,168 fans with an 89-65 victory.

Mainly it was Joe DePre of the Redmen who put the leash on the Terriers clicking on 16 of his 19 shots from the floor, for 87 per cent, and two for two from the foul line for a total of 34 points just 5 short of the St. John's gym record set by Rick Barry, then with Miami in 1964.

When Lou Carnesecca, the St. John's coach, took DePre out at 11:19 of the second half, the fans, sensing a near record began to chant, "We want Joe-Joe."

"The object of the game is to win," said Carnesecca later. "I would have felt terrible if I let him play and he set a record and then got injured."

DePre Awarded Trophy

DePre won the most-valuable-player trophy presented annually to the outstanding player in this series, and Lou Carnesecca carried off the Catholic Youth Organization Trophy marking the 47th St. John's victory in the 59 games played since 1922.

Bill Paultz, St. John's 6-foot-11-inch center, played an outstanding game, scoring 15 points and grabbing 15 rebounds. Defensively he limited his rival, 6-foot-7-inch Earl Roberts, who had averaged 17.4 points a game, to 2 points. Roberts had been shooting 61 per cent from the floor and was ranked nationally 11th in accuracy.

John Conforti, who had been averaging 28.1 points prior to the game and shooting at a 62 per cent clip from the floor, scored 24 points for the Terriers.

With only a minute left in the first half, St. John's had built a 35-20 lead.

Conforti scored all 5 St. Francis points in the first nine minutes. However he picked up three personal fouls. Jim Sullivan, who scored 16 of his 18 points in the second half, wound up second high scorer and Mike McDermott with 8 of his 12 after intermission was the only other player in the game to score in double figures.

Terriers' Dottrina Excels

Lou Dottrina, the Terrier's 5-10 forward, turned in a spectacular performance. He blocked four shots and scored 7 points while leading the St. Francis rebounders with six grabs.

"I used to high jump in Xaverian High School," said Dottrina, who is probably the smallest forward in the country. "My best was 6-foot-1."

"We just don't have the height," said Les Yellin, who has taken over as coach as Danny Lynch's successor. "It hurts most when their center is so much bigger than ours, but I think we'll come around. This is only our second loss, and none of the other teams we play besides St. Bonaventure has a center as big as Paultz."

St. John's now has a 9-4 won-lost record, while the Terriers are 7-2.

Conforti received the Pi Alpha Fraternity Trophy presented each year to the outstanding St. Francis player.

— Georgetown's basketball team, paced by Mike Laughna's 18 points and Charlie Adrion's 17, upset Columbia, 72-68, tonight.

The Lions' Jim McMillian, with 23 points, and Heyward Dotson, with 18, paced the losers. Columbia led at half-time, 34-28.

With Adrion and Laughna leading the way in the second half, Georgetown pulled ahead by 50-48 with 11:28 remaining, then broke a 54-54 tie at 6:08 and remained on top.

The victory was Georgetown's seventh straight and raised its record to 12-2. Columbia is 13-2.
