

# Penn Overcomes Brown Stall, 37-33, and Retains Ivy League Crown

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### QUAKERS FINISH SCHEDULE AT 23-2

Victory Is Their 500th in  
Ivy League—Next Foe Is  
Providence in Tourney

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PROVIDENCE, R.I., March 4  
—Brown almost pulled off the  
miracle of Marvel Gymnasium  
tonight by holding the ball  
against the University of Penn-  
sylvania, but the Quakers  
scored a 37-33 victory to clinch  
their third straight Ivy League  
title.

With the triumph, Penn's 23d  
of the season against two de-  
feats, the Quakers also became  
the first team to win 500 Ivy  
League games. They finished  
the season with a 13-1 won-lost  
league record and have won 41  
of their last 42 league games.

Penn now faces Providence  
at St. John's next Saturday in  
the opening round of the Na-  
tional Collegiate Athletic Asso-  
ciation tournament Eastern  
Regionals.

#### Only 2 in Double Figures

Corky Calhoun, 6-foot-7-inch  
senior from Waukegan, Ill., who  
had 9 points in the first half,  
shared scoring honors with  
Arnie Berman of Brown, a 6-7  
senior from Short Hills, N. J.  
Each had 13 points. They were  
the only players in double fig-  
ures.

Berman was both a star and  
a key to the defeat. Stationed  
in the corner of Brown's 3-2  
offense to pop long shots, he  
missed 9 of 13 shots. Ten of his  
points came after intermission.

Penn's two leading scorers  
from the night before against  
Yale, Phil Hankinson, 6-8 jun-  
ior, and Bob Morse, 6-8 senior,  
missed 6 of 10 and 6 of 7 to-  
night and scored just 8 and 5  
points, respectively.

The Quakers missed their  
first four shots of the game,  
but Brown was able to convert  
it into only a 4-0 lead on bas-  
kets by Rich Cureton and Ber-  
man.

#### At Half: Penn 18, Brown 16

Baskets by Hankinson and  
Calhoun tied the score, 4-4. The  
Quakers took their first lead,  
8-6, on a Calhoun field goal  
with 12:05 to play in the half.

There were five ties and five  
lead changes after that, with  
Penn going to the dressing room  
at half-time leading by 2 points,  
18-16.

The only time Penn had been  
held to such a low total this  
season was when Temple,  
which also held the ball, led,  
27-17, at the half in a game the  
Quakers lost, 57-52. That forc-  
ed the Quakers into a tie with  
the Owls for the Philadelphia  
Big Five title.
