

RALLY BY CORNELL TOPS PENN, 24-20

McKeown Snares 11-Yard
Pass With 0:35 to Play

ITHACA, N. Y., Oct. 14—Cornell received last-minute heroics from John McKeown for the second straight week, as it rallied to defeat Pennsylvania, 24-20, on Schoellkopf Field today.

With the Big Red trailing, 20-17, and 35 seconds left to play, McKeown leaped between two Penn defenders to grab an 11-yard pass from Mark Allen in the end zone. Last week, McKeown returned a blocked field goal 84 yards for a touchdown that put Cornell back in the Rutgers game.

Cornell had jumped to a 17-0 lead by the middle of the third period, but Penn stormed back on quick drives to gain the lead.

Cornell scored on its first possession, when Allen, who completed 18 of 38 passes for 252 yards, hit his tight end, George Milosevic, on a 15-yard scoring pass. A sophomore tailback, Dan Malone, did most of the work during the drive, carrying nine times for 33 yards. Despite sitting out almost the entire second period, Malone finished with 127 yards in 27 carries.

Fumble Costs Penn

Penn mounted a sustained drive late in the second period, but Tom Pinto fumbled while rolling out on the Cornell 5 and a Cornell linebacker, Jen Tracomas, recovered to end the threat.

Cornell led 7-0 at half-time, despite a strong drive just before the half ended. Allen tried to hit McKeown on three successive pass attempts, but Penn's Ken Bald picked off the third one. Cornell got the ball right back when Steve Lahr intercepted. But the half ended as McKeown caught a 35-yard pass on the one-yard line of Penn.

Malone scored Cornell's second touchdown five minutes into the third period, when he went over from the 1.

Pinto began to find the range midway through the third period, as he hit Don Clune for three straight passes and 36 yards. Penn drove to the Cornell 5, where Cornell prepared to hold on fourth down. Ralph McGee caught a pass at the Cornell 1, though, and ran the ball into the end zone on the next play.

Penn scored again on the next possession, traveling 40 yards in only four plays. McGee sprinted 39 yards down the sideline to the Cornell 1, then Pinto scored.

Early in the fourth period, Cornell was forced to punt, and Beld returned the ball to the Red 37. Four plays later, on a fourth down and eight, Pinto hit the streaking Adolph Bellizeare for a 35-yard touchdown completion.
