

Penn Trounces Yale Five, 78-49, and Climbs Back to First in Ivy League

ELIS A THREAT ONLY AT OUTSET

Hankinson Gets 24 Points as Quakers Make 52% of Shots at New Haven

NEW HAVEN, Feb. 24—Pennsylvania, upset by Brown last night, climbed back into the Ivy League basketball lead today by routing Yale, 78-49. The Quakers have an 10-2 won-lost Ivy record and are 18-5 over all. After a slow start, they resembled the defending league champions they are.

Yale, which upset Princeton last night, fell to a 6-6 Ivy mark and 9-14 on the season.

The Elis made a game of it only in the early going. They led briefly by a point, then fell behind as Penn scored 6 straight points, 4 on jump shots by John Beecroft.

Ron Haigler of Brooklyn hit a jump shot to put Penn ahead, 9-7, and the Quakers were never again headed.

Haigler wound up with 13 points. Phil Hankinson of Great Neck, L. I., led the Penn attack with 24. Mike Baskauskas paced Yale with 18.

Penn made 33 of 64 field-goal attempts for 52 per cent, while Yale managed only 19 of 59 for 33 per cent. Penn out-rebounded the Elis, 50-40.

Brown Upsets Princeton

PROVIDENCE, Feb. 24—Brown University's young basketball team ended years of frustration tonight by defeating Princeton, 68-62, at the Providence Civic Center. The victory knocked the Tigers out of a tie for Ivy League lead.

The Bruins had not defeated the Tigers since Jan. 9, 1960. Princeton had won 26 straight games in the 13-year span. Princeton is 9-3 in the league and Brown, 8-4.

Princeton, on a late surge, led 33-31, at the half. The Tigers zipped out to a 42-35 edge when play resumed. But the Bruins evened the score at 43-43. After two more ties, Eddie Morris sank two free throws with 7:30 left that put Brown ahead for keeps at 50-48.

Dartmouth Edges Columbia

HANOVER, N.H., Feb. 24 (AP)—James Brown broke a tie with a field goal and two free throws tonight and lifted Dartmouth to a 76-74 overtime victory over Columbia.

Brown, who helped rally the Big Green from a 13-point deficit to a 66-66 regulation tie, topped all scorers with 29 points.

Bob Evans scored 25 points for Columbia, including 15 of 17 from the free-throw line.

The outcome left the teams with identical records of 6-17 over all and 4-8 in the Ivy League.

Brown Nears Harvard Mark

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 24 (AP)—James Brown closed in on the all-time career scoring record for Harvard tonight with a 17-point performance as the Crimson defeated Cornell, 93-81.

Brown, a 6-foot-6-inch senior increased his career total to 1,221 points. He is second to Keith Sedlacek who graduated in 1966 with a 1,262 points. Brown has two games left to play.

Louisville Tops Cincinnati

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 24 (AP)—Allen Murphy scored 24 points to lead Louisville to its 20th victory of the season, a 91-81 triumph over Cincinnati tonight. Louisville, hoping for a National Invitation Tournament berth since Memphis State clinched the Missouri Valley Conference championship earlier today, lost to Cincinnati earlier in the season, one of its six defeats.
