

Quakers Down Cornell

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 24—

Marty Vaughn led Penn to its second straight winning season on Franklin Field today, throwing three touchdown passes as the Red and Blue beat Cornell, 31-22, before 24,559 fans.

The victory was the sixth of the year for Penn against three defeats and its fifth in the Ivy League against two setbacks. The Quakers, beating Cornell for the 41st time since the series began in 1893, also ended a four-year string by the Big Red.

Vaughn, who leads the Ivy League in total offense and in passing, threw scoring passes of 16 yards to Don Clune, the All-Ivy receiver, and 33 yards and 14 yards to Jack Wixsted, a back.

Adolph Bellizeare, sixth in the nation in all-purpose running with a 159 average, broke loose for a 73-yard run on a punt return and scored Penn's first touchdown late in the opening quarter.

Bellizeare also rushed for 43 yards and set a Penn career rushing mark (in two varsity seasons) of 1,595 yards. Tim Martin, Penn's outstanding place-kicker, booted four conversions and a 37-yard field goal in the second period. That score gave Penn a 17-7 lead at half-time.

Penn got a strong defensive game from John Lyons, the safety, who twice intercepted passes by Mark Allen and from Bob Thomson, the defensive end, who twice batted down Allen passes.

Cornell, unable to run against Penn, went to the air and Allen fired scoring passes to Horace Bradshaw and Bruce Starks of 36 and 53 yards, respectively, Bradshaw scored Cornell's other touchdown on a 10-yard burst in the third period.

Allen set a host of records in winding up a brilliant career. He broke the Ivy single-game record of most passes attempted with 56 (Marty Domres of Columbia threw 54 against Brown in 1968). Allen completed 27 passes, a single-game Cornell record and completed 119 for the season, another Cornell career record. He also threw for 395 yards against Penn, another Cornell mark.

But all of Allen's aerial wizardry was not good enough to offset Penn's alert play. After his brilliant punt return, Bellezeare raced 48 yards with another punt, and Vaughn completed the drive with his touchdown pass to Clune. It was the 99th catch of his career and the 12th in the league, also a record.

Penn marched 80 yards in five plays, then settled for Martin's field goal. In the third period Penn went 64 yards in three plays (with Clune picking up 30 yards on one of his five receptions capped by the scoring pass to Wixsted.
