

Princeton Defeated by Quakers, 20-18

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 26—

In a struggle between unbeaten but tired teams, Penn warded off late passing thrusts by Ron Beible of Princeton for a 20-18 Ivy League triumph. It was the 66th meeting between the teams since 1876 and was played before 23,317 fans at Franklin Field.

After trailing, 14-0 at half-time and 20-3 in the third quarter, Princeton came roaring back. Walt Snickenberger, who stood sixth in national rushing before the game, scored one touchdown and Beible passed 36 yards to Neil Chamberlin for another. This score came at the 12-minute mark of the fourth quarter, when Scott Morrison, who had kicked a 34-yard field, added the extra point, Princeton trailed by only 2 points, 20-18.

Morrison's kickoff following this touchdown was taken by Jack Wixted, on the 1-yard line. He ran it back to the 12. Wixted had been a big paze of Penn's ground game, gaining 123 yards in 20 carries.

It was the fourth straight game he rushed for more than 100 yards.

Penn's danger was then relieved when Tim Martin made a soaring 62-yard punt to Princeton's 6. The Tigers were unable to move from there as Beible's failed to

connect with his receivers in face of an alert Penn defense. Penn took over on the Tigers' 4-yard line and to the 1 as time ran out.

Penn and Princeton went into the game with similar 3-0-1 records. The Series between the schools stands 49-16-1 in favor of Princeton, but this was the third straight triumph for Penn.

The passing of Marty Vaughn stood out for Penn in the first half but his work was overshadowed by the throwing of Beible in the second half. In addition to the rushing of Wixted, Adolph Bellizeare carried the ball 19 times for 77 yards and Snickenberger 24 times for 62 yards for Princeton. Vaughn hit 11 out of 19 times for 118 yards and two touchdowns; Beible completed 13 of 34 passes for 223 yards and one touchdown.

Marty Vaughn, the Penn captain, attained a career mark of 26 touchdown passes in taking his team to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter.

The Penn drive for the first score was for 51 yards in six plays. Penn got possession when Jeff Koury picked off a pass by Ron Beible on the Penn 32 and returned it to the 49. Jack Wixted was the prime ground-gainer as Penn moved swiftly to Princeton's 9. Vaughn then threw to Ron Kellogg who made a leaping left-handed catch in the end zone for the touchdown at 8:50. Tim Martin's placement made the score, 7-0.

A poor kick of 30 yards by Mike Stein set Penn in motion again, this time for 68 yards in six plays. A 30-yard pass from Vaughn to Bucky Bucola, who made a sparkling catch put Penn on the Tigers' 20-yard line. Wixted gained 15 in two plays. Vaughn then hit Bucola in the right end zone for the touchdown at 14:49. Martin again converted for a 14-0 edge.

Princeton moved into Penn territory for the first time in the early minutes of the second quarter, going from its 20 to the Red and Blue 34, mainly on two lengthy passes, Beible to Neil Chamberlin for 18 yards and to Bob Harding for 25. But the drive faded, and the half ended with Penn holding a 14-0 lead.
