Penn Coasts to Victory Over Columbia, 113-69

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 7 — Shortly after Pennsylvania trounced Columbia, 113-69, at the Palestra tonight, Chuck Daly, the Quakers' coach, said, "They just didn't have any size inside against us. So in our place it made it a relatively easy game."

That was it in a nutshell as the Quakers set a school scoring record for an Ivy League basketball game and maintained their one-game lead in the Ivy race over Princeton and Brown. Pennsylvania is going after its sixth straight Ivy title and sixth straight berth in the National Collegiate tourna-

ment.

The result was not surprising because the big, fast and strong Quakers were expected to run away from the Lions, who are last in the Ivy League with a 1-4 mark (3-16 over all). Only 3,207 fans turned out and many of them spent their time throwing things such as toilet paper floor.

Over the last $5\frac{1}{2}$ seasons, the Quakers have won 44 games in the Palestra while losing only 2. In that span, Pennsylvania's total Ivy rec-

ord is 72-5.

Six of the Quakers scored in double figures and three had 10 or more rebounds. The point leaders were Ron Haigler, 24; Bob Bigelow, 17 and Mark Lonetto, 16. Haigler had 14 rebounds, and Henry Johnson and Bigelow had 11 and 10, respectively.

Johnson scored 11 points, but put in 2 for Columbia. In the first half, he went up to rebound a Columbia shot. Instead of tipping the ball to a teammate, Johnson tipped it through the net, giving the Lions a 6-6 tie after 2 minutes 45 seconds of play.

That was the last time Co-

lumbia was even with the Quakers, who ran off and broke their former Ivy high of 111 points in a victory over Cornell, Feb. 25, 1972.
