

Columbia Subdues Penn Eleven, 28-25

Behind the brilliant running of Doug Jackson, who rushed for a record 194 yards on 33 carries and scored three touchdowns, Columbia beat Penn in an Ivy League game, 28-25, yesterday at Baker Field. The victory was Columbia's second of the season and second in the league and left the Lions alone in sixth place.

Jackson, a senior from Bristol, Conn., got strong support in his record performance from Columbia's offensive line. "They played an excellent game," said Coach Bill Campbell.

Jackson's 194-yard effort gave him all Columbia rushing marks. He now has rushed for 1,401 yards in his career, breaking the record of 1,208, set by Tom Haggarty from 1959 through 1961. And Jackson's season mark of 787 yards surpassed the 766 of Lou Kusserow, set in 1948.

The Lions, now with a 2-6 won-lost mark, almost gave this game away in the final 30 minutes after taking a 21-7 half-time lead.

Penn, under the superb passing of Bob Graustein, came back to score two touchdowns in the third period and got another in the final quarter.

Columbia suddenly developed butter fingers after the intermission, probably because of Penn's hard hitting and the windy 47-degree temperature.

Penn took advantage of three lost Columbia fumbles to score after the half, and an intercepted pass led to the Quakers' first touchdown in the second period.

Carl Smith started at quarterback for the Quakers and could not move his club. Penn improved as soon as Graustein, the regular signal-caller, took over late in the opening period. Graustein passed for three touchdowns — to Jim Delehanty and twice to Tim Kelly. Johnny Mason scored the other Penn touchdown on a 1-yard plunge in the second period.

Graustein, returning from a shoulder injury suffered against Yale, finished with 197 yards on 22 completions in 32 attempts. That tied the individual Penn mark of 22 set by Pancho Micir against Yale in 1970. Graustein's completions, plus one by Smith, broke the team record for one game — also 22 — set in the 1970 Yale game.

Jackson got his first score in the opening 15 minutes on a 2-yard run, capping a Columbia drive of 80 yards in

eight plays. The Lions took a 14-0 lead when Jackson broke loose on a 50-yard jaunt moments later, finishing another 80-yard march in six plays.

Dave Simm set up Penn's first touchdown when he intercepted a Mike Delaney pass deep in Penn territory. Penn went 60 yards in eight plays with Mason capping the drive.

But Jackson came right back on another 1-yard touchdown plunge to end another Columbia drive of 71 yards in 10 plays.

Penn rallied after the intermission, then Delaney scored Columbia's final touchdown at 10:28 of the third period when he broke away off tackle and sped 31 yards into the end zone. Bob McKeon added his fourth conversion for Columbia's 28th point.
