# Rutgers and Manhattan Beat Two of Philadelphia Big Five

Undefeated Rutgers went on a scoring rampage in the final 10 minutes in posting a 95-80 college basketball victory over Pennsylvania last night at Madison Square Garden.

In the opening game of the double-header, Manhattan held on long enough in the closing seconds to beat Philadelphia's other Big Five entry in the program, La Salle, 79-78.

Ricky Marsh led the Jaspers to their second victory in four games by scoring 23 points. Tom Lockhart got 16 and Steve Grant contributed 15.

Mike Arizin, son of the former pro, Paul Arizin, scored 22 for the Explorers as did Charlie Wise.

Phil Sellers, the heart of Rutgers' sizzling offense, finished with a game-high 32

points as the Scarlet Knights won No. 5.

Penn's sophomore sensation, Keven McDonald, scored 18 points, but only 5 in the second half, most of which he sat out because of foul trouble. The teams were tied at the half, but Rutgers won with a 49-34 second half.

McDonald left the game with 15 minutes 24 seconds to play, but Penn climbed into a 65-65 tie with 10:33 left.

Then the Scarlet took off, controlling the rebounding on the efforts of Jim Bailey, a 6-foot-8-inch freshman from Boston.

In the next eight minutes, Rutgers took complete charge, moving to an 80-65 margin by pouring in 15 points while Penn went scoreless. Mark Lonetto finally broke the drought for Penn with a basket from the side, but Rutgers ran off another streak of 11 for a 20-point lead with 1:21 to go.

Coach Tom Young of Rutgers said of the victory: "We were sluggish in the first half, so I asked them to hold Penn to 25 points in the second half. They nearly made it [34 points]."

"It was a solid team effort. Bailey played just a super, super game. For a freshman to do that in the Garden was something extra. I would like to keep him on the bench; then bring him in to strengthen our defense. But it's getting harder and harder to do that."

Bailey, with the experienced help of Sellers on the boards, collected nine rebounds. More than that he scored 14 points. Sellers, who had 18 points in the first half, pulled down 10 rebounds and Hollis Copeland grabbed eight.

Chuck Daly, Penn's coach, said: "I think Rutgers is one of the finest teams in the

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country. They have the depth and can do everything they have to do."

In the first game, the shooting of Marsh and Lockhart carried Manhattan to a 42-41 half-time lead. Each scored 14 points, with Lockhart making seven of his 12 shots and Marsh putting in five of the Jaspers' first eight field goals.

The Jaspers had a 7-point lead four times early in the second half. But La Salle rallied over the next 10 minutes, outscoring Manhattan, 14-8, to pull within a point at 64-63, with little more than seven minutes to play.

From that point, the game became a shot-for-shot affair for the 8,274 customers.

Marsh had a chance to seal the victory with 27 seconds left on a one-and-one situation, but he missed the first shot. Arizin, whose 3-point play just before that had brought the Explorers within a point again, also missed the final shot of the game. The ball hit the rim and bounced into the hands of Lockhart.

Coach Jack Powers of Manhattan said: "I was getting tired of losing one-point games. We got a great effort from Chris Dye, our freshman who replaced Larry Frazier when he was having a tough night. Our 1-4 defense was rigged to stop Wise from shooting outside. We knew he couldn't shoot over Marsh, and that gave our rebounders a chance to get close.

"Now we have beaten the team that was picked to win the Philadelphia Big Five."
