

# Princeton Averts Upset By Yale and Wins, 49-48

NEW HAVEN, Feb. 14 — Princeton, the Ivy League leader, went scoreless for the last five minutes tonight, but managed to beat Yale, 49-48, when a last-second shot by Steve Switchenko of the Elis bounced off the rim.

Princeton, now with a 8-0 won-lost mark in Ivy play and 16-4 on the season, had all it could handle as the Elis threatened to pull off the upset of the campaign. Yale, 2-6 in the Ivy League and 4-18 over all, had its last chance when Princeton's Armond Hill lost a long downcourt pass out of bounds with 49 seconds to play.

Yale worked the ball until 15 seconds remained, then called time out to set up its final shot. However, the Tigers, the nation's top defensive team, switched from a zone to a man-to-man defense and collapsed on Switchenko as he tossed up a 15-foot jumper that hit the rim and bounded away at the buzzer.

The Tigers, in winning their fourth straight game, took the lead for good with 9:28 to play when Bob Kleintert connected on a 20-foot jump shot for a 45-44 advantage.

## Columbia 84, Dartmouth 69

Columbia, led by the shooting of Elmer Love and Larry Collins, two forwards, defeated Dartmouth, 84-69, last night in Levien Gym and moved into third place in the Ivy League.

Love, a 6-6 sophomore, and Collins, a 6-4 senior, were

almost unstoppable in the first half when the Lions jumped to a 47-26 lead. Love scored 19 of his 21 points in the first 20 minutes and forced Dartmouth's standout, Adam Sutton, into three fouls in the first three minutes. Collins hit on all six field-goal tries in the first half and ended with 20 points on 9 of 12 floor shooting.

The victory, coupled with Friday's 75-67 triumph over Harvard, marked the first time since 1971 that the Lions had been able to win both ends of a league weekend series.
