

Penn Downs Cornell, 17-7, In First Ivy Game at Night

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 17 (UPI)—The University of Pennsylvania and Cornell, who traditionally meet Thanksgiving Day, played the first Ivy League night game in history and Penn won, 17-7, tonight.

Dennis Grosvenor's 2-yard scoring plunge in the second period and a 1-yard scamper by the junior quarterback, Tony Sciolla, in the third period, gave Penn a working edge going into the final quarter at Franklin Field.

Then Rich Le Van added a 30-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter. The teams were tied, 7-7, at halftime.

Craig Jeager, who scored for Cornell in the second period on a 12-yard scamper, ran 62 yards with five minutes to play for what looked like a score. However, a clipping call against Cornell

nullified the touchdown and the Big Red eventually lost the ball on downs at the Quaker 17.

The game also marked the return to the league of Cornell's coach, Bob Blackman, after six years at Illinois.

Blackman spent 19 years in the Ivy League at Dartmouth, where he had three undefeated seasons and won or tied for seven league titles.

Rhode Island 14, Holy Cross 0

KINGSTON, R. I., Sept. 17 (AP)—A third-period touchdown by a freshman tailback, Leroy Shaw, broke a scoreless tie and led the University of Rhode Island to a 14-0 victory over Holy Cross today. It was the first time in 30 games Holy Cross had been shut out.
