

Penn Passes for 0 Yards, Runs by Princeton, 21-10

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 29—After fumbling and stumbling all season, the University of Pennsylvania football team may have finally put its whole act together today in a 21-10 victory over Princeton before a crowd of 14,696 at Franklin Field.

The Pennsylvania act is a first-I-take-it-and-then-you-take-it number involving a pair of juniors, Tom Roland, the wishbone quarterback, and Denis Grosvenor, the fullback. It all amounts to a run-run offense.

And that's exactly how the Quakers ground Princeton into the AstroTurf today. Every inch of their 331 yards of total offense was gained on the ground, enabling them along the way to establish a season school rushing record of 2,076 yards, surpassing the previous mark of 2,024 set in 1972. And the Quakers still have two games to play.

Grosvenor Gains 140

The 6-foot-1-inch Grosvenor, out of Fairfield, Conn., gained 140 yards today on 31 attempts, sparking the Quakers on scoring marches of 73, 35 and 70 yards and getting the final touchdown himself from a yard out in the fourth quarter to put icing on the victory.

Roland, 6-1 and 195 pounds, out of Manheim, Pa., rushed 18 times for 78 yards. He threw only three passes, each of them incomplete, but he pitched out to Johnny Mason on a 19-yard play for Penn's first touchdown and handed off to Kevin Blake for a 2-yard plunge in the third quarter that gave the Quakers the lead for good.

The victory was Penn's fourth in seven games and third in five Ivy games, and it put the Quakers in a spot to possibly grab a share of the league title. They play Harvard next week at Cambridge and in two weeks play here against Dartmouth, which is tied with Yale for first place, both at 4-1. Of course, the Quakers would need someone to knock off Yale, which they almost did themselves last week when they led, 14-0, but eventually lost, 27-21. Earlier this season the Quakers fumbled away a game to Columbia, and that loss is looking bigger.

Princeton, which upset Harvard last week, fell away from the Ivy title pic-

ture with today's defeat, dropping to 2-3 in league play and 2-5 over all.

Bobby Isom, the senior tailback from North Babylon, L.I., who gained 204 yards for Princeton last Saturday, picked up only 53 yards in 19 carries against Penn, his worst rushing performance of the season. But then, Princeton gained just 95 yards on the ground, and it was Isom who scored the Tigers' lone touchdown, running 2 yards with a pitchout in the second quarter to tie the score, 7-7.

Kirby Lockhart, Princeton's senior quarterback, had the air all to himself. He threw 19 passes, completing 13 for 144 yards, with six of the completions going to Richard Keefe, the split end.

Lockhart's arm moved the Tigers on both of their scoring drives. On the second one, which stalled on the Penn 18, they received a 35-yard field goal by Chris Howe that gave them a 10-7 lead at the half.

Colgate 43, Boston U. 22

BOSTON, Oct. 29 (AP) — Unbeaten Colgate, the nation's major college leader in total offense, rode the passing of Bob Relph and the running of Pat Healey to a 43-22 victory over Boston University today.

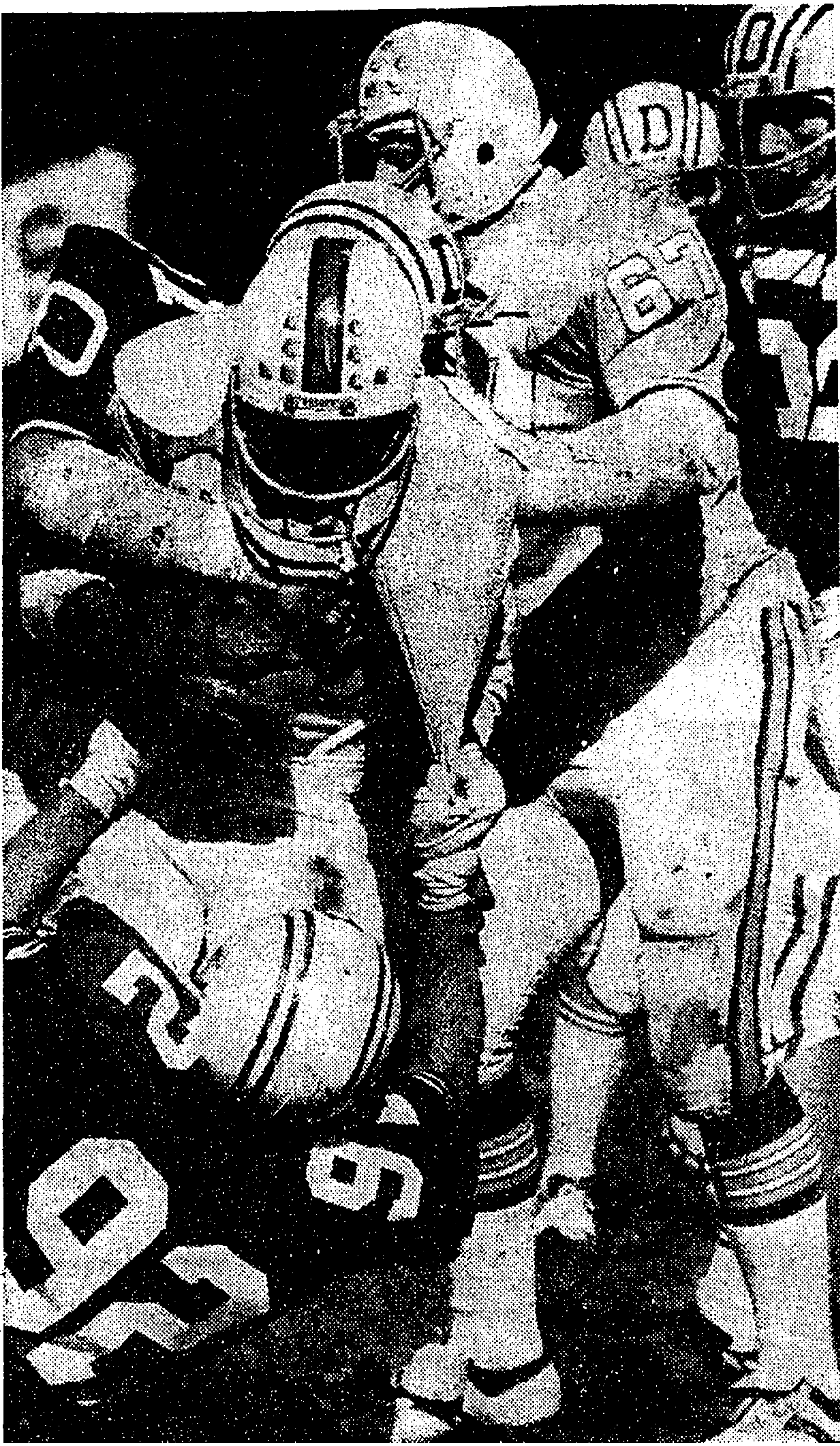
Relph opened the scoring by sprinting 9 yards on a quarterback keeper in the second period and then passed to Dick Slenker in the end zone for touchdown passes of 32 and 41 yards, giving the Red Raiders a 21-13 half-time lead.

Healey scored on touchdown runs of 20 and 2 yards in the second half as Colgate fought back B. U. challenges and raises its won-lost record to 8-0.

Colgate, which had averaged 476 yards in total offense in its first seven games, piled up 560 yards, 267 rushing and 293 passing. Relph connected on 15 of 29 passes.

Healey, Colgate's career rushing leader, gained 94 yards in 18 carries. His running mate, Henry White, netted 85 yards on 17 carries. Boston U. (2-5) got yeoman work from Mal Najarian, a sophomore, who carried 30 times for 187 yards.

Colgate threatened to pull away in the second half as Healey broke loose on his 20-yard scoring run and helped the Red Raiders to a 28-13 lead.
