

# Wolfpack Is Upset by Maryland

RALEIGH, N.C., Jan. 10 (AP) — Ernest Graham scored a game-high 24 points, including a turnaround jumper with seven seconds left in the second overtime tonight, to give Maryland an 82-81 upset victory over eighth-ranked North Carolina State in an Atlantic Coast Conference basketball game.

The wolfpack's final opportunity to salvage a victory failed when Charles (Hawkeye) Whitney missed a 15-footer at the buzzer.

Maryland improved its won-lost record to 11-3 over all and 2-1 in the A.C.C., while N.C. State dropped to 11-3 on the season and 0-2 in the league.

The score was tied 74-74 at the end of regulation play and neither team was able to score in the first overtime.

N.C. State tried to shut down the hot-shooting Terps by controlling the ball for the last 3:47 in regulation play before Clyde Austin tried a 20-foot shot that missed.

Maryland struck first in the second overtime when Buck Williams made a layup with 4:18 remaining. N.C. State's Tony Warren tied it 78-78 when he hit a jumper with 3:51 left.

But Maryland's Albert King gave the Terps the lead again when he took a Dutch Morley pass and made a layup with 34 seconds left.

A 3-point play by Kendal (Tiny) Pinder with 19 seconds left gave the Wolfpack a short-lived lead before Graham sank his game-winning jumper.

Maryland also got offensive firepower from Larry Gibson with 20 points, King with 15 and Williams with 12. Pinder's 23 points paced the Wolfpack attack.

**Penn 79, Temple 74**

**La Salle 90, W. Kentucky 66**

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 10 (AP) — Jim Salters, a 5-foot-11-inch point guard, scored 21 points while his teammate, Tony Price, added 19 as Penn knocked Temple from the unbeaten ranks, 79-74, tonight in the second game of a doubleheader.

In the first game, Junior Michael Brooks scored 21 and collected 17 rebounds as he led La Salle to a 90-66 victory over Western Kentucky. Greg Jackson's 16 were high for the losers.

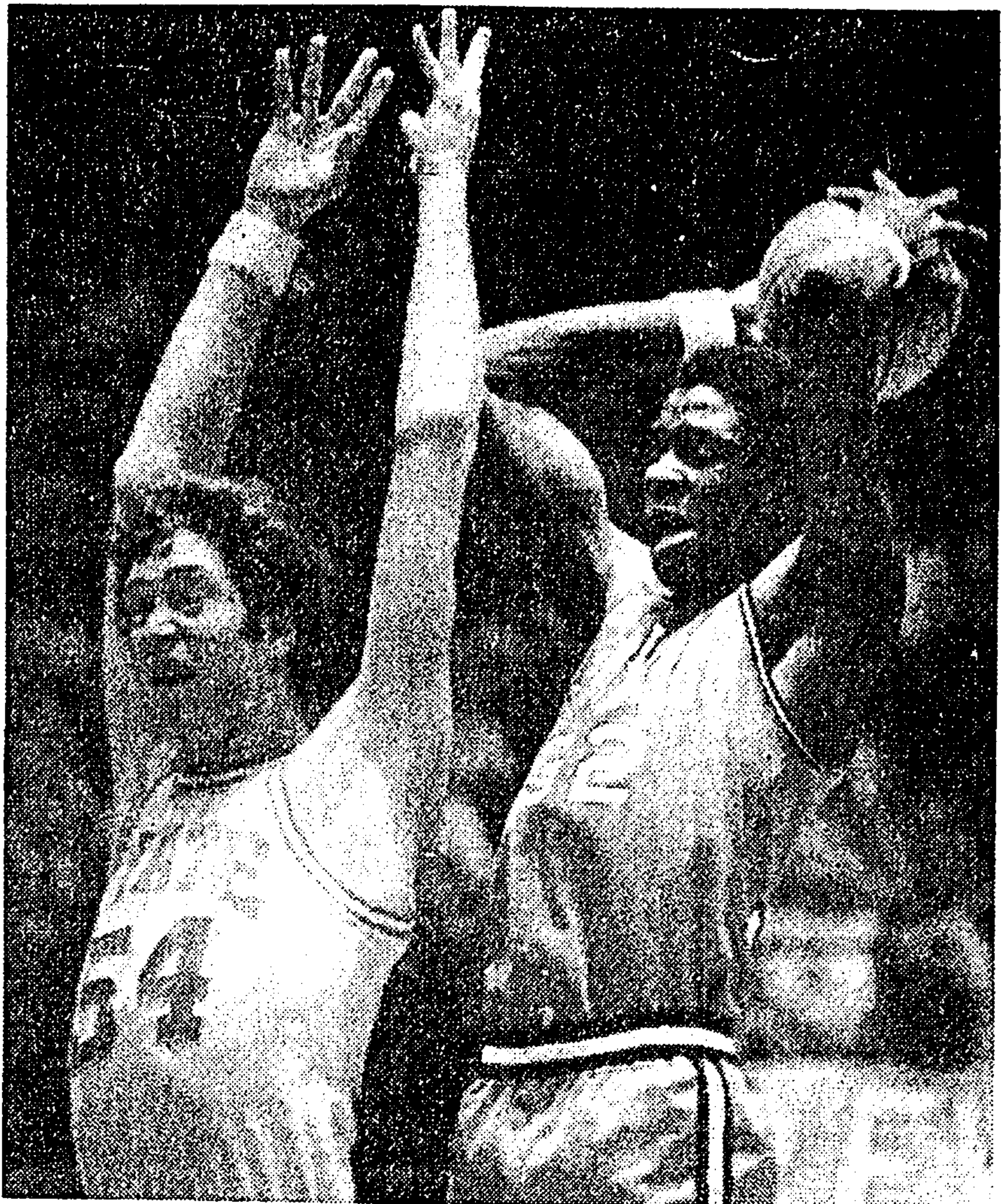
A sellout crowd of 9,200 watched Penn snap a tie at 14 with 12:21 left in the first half and then run off 15 consecutive points to assume a 29-14 lead. Penn never trailed after that and went on to earn its eighth victory against two losses, while handing Temple its first loss in 12 games.

**Duke 73, Clemson 54**

DURHAM, N.C., Jan. 10 (AP) — Led by Mike Gminski's 17 points and 11 rebounds, Duke trounced Clemson, 73-54, before a capacity crowd in Duke's Cameron Indoor Stadium tonight.

The Blue Devils, who were playing their first Atlantic Coast Conference game, raised their record to 10-2, while the Tigers dropped their third straight. Clemson is now 9-3 over all and 0-2 in the A.C.C.

Duke had a balanced attack, with three others players besides Gminski scoring in double figures. Jim Spanarckel and Kenny Dennard each scored 14 points; Gene Banks added 12 points and 12 rebounds.

**Fordham 97, Merrimack 53**

In dominating the rebounding by 59-38, Fordham defeated Merrimack College, 97-53, last night at their Rose Hill gym in the Bronx.

After an uneventful first half which Fordham led, 32-25, the Rams began to exploit their height advantage in the second half.

Merrimack tried to force the Rams out of their zone, but only shot 32 percent for the game. The big reason for the Rams' success was their 7-foot center, Dud (Dude) Tongal, who poured in the Rams' season high of 30 points. Fordham upped their record to 4-8, while Merrimack fell to 1-9.

**W. Forest 59, N. Carolina 56**

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C., Jan. 10 (AP) — Wake Forest employed its spread offense with authority for the second straight game tonight and Frank Johnson put in 19 points as the Deacons upset North Carolina, 59-56. Guy Morgan and Jim Johnstone added 14 points each.

After trailing for the majority of the first half, Wake Forest (8-5) pushed ahead on a Johnson layup midway in the second half to give the Deacons their first lead at 41-39. Wake Forest then went to the spread offense, which it used effectively in last Saturday's 66-60 upset of Maryland.

North Carolina's record now stands at 10-2 over all and 2-1 in the A.C.C.

**St. Peter's 70, Hofstra 69**

JERSEY CITY, Jan. 10 (AP) — Kevin Bannon, held to 6 points during the first 35 minutes, erupted for 10 of St. Peter's final 12 points, including the winning basket with just nine seconds left, to lead the Peacocks to a 70-69 victory tonight over Hofstra.

Henry Hollingsworth gave Hofstra (5-8) its final lead with a jumper with 21 seconds left. But Bannon scored in traf-

fic with nine seconds left. Hofstra's Brian Appel attempted a shot with five seconds remaining that missed.

Bannon had 16 points and eight rebounds to lead the Peacocks, who also got 13 points, 11 rebounds, seven assists and four blocked shots from Jim Brandon before he fouled out. Woods had 16 points to lead Hofstra.

**Iona 78, Niagara 66**

NEW ROCHELLE, N.Y., Jan. 10 (AP) — Jeff Ruland scored 23 points and grabbed 12 rebounds tonight as Iona scored a 78-66 victory over Niagara.

Kevin Hamilton, a guard, added 22 points while a reserve center, Kevin Vecsey, blocked six shots for Iona.

Niagara's leading scorer, Garry Jordan, carried a 23.5-points-a-game average into the contest but was held to 7 points.

**Syracuse 85, Penn State 70**

SYRACUSE, Jan. 10 (AP) — Roosevelt Bouie and Dan Schayes combined for 34 points tonight to lead Syracuse to an 85-70 victory over Penn State. Bouie finished with 20 points.

The victory was a record 38th in a row for Syracuse at Manley Field House.

Three Penn State starters fouled out, while another, Jim Solic, was ejected for committing a blatant foul.

Syracuse (11-2) took control of the game in the first half, opening up a 26-13 lead on the outside shooting of Marty Head and 6 points by Bouie.

**Adelphi 93, Queens 58**

GARDEN CITY, L.I., Jan. 10 — Gordie McCrae scored 19 points and had six assists to lead Adelphi University to a 93-58 romp over Queens College tonight.

Reggie Parker added 16 points for the winners who are now 10-3. Edgar Moore had 20 for the losers who are now 5-6.
